

The high ground in this area is known as 'Flegg Isle', made up of material deposited in the Ice Age. Many village names here end in 'by' indicating Danish settlements in 800-900 AD.

- 1 Stokesby has a village green and riverside staithe. There is also a cycle hire centre.
- 2 St. Andrew's Church has a thatched roof and dates from 13th Century.
- 3 Runham. If you look out southward along this road you will have views across the Halvergate marshes – the largest expanse of grazing marsh in Europe.
- 4 If you take the short detour to St Peter and St Paul's church you will find a charming church with a Saxon round tower.
- 5 Thrigby Wildlife Gardens is renowned for its specialised collection of Asian mammals, birds and reptiles in the beautifully landscaped grounds and gardens of Thrigby Hall. Joshua Smith built the hall itself in 1736. A Willow Pattern garden, based on those Chinese blue plates, is home to pheasants, cranes and Mandarin ducks as well as many other species. Open all year.

- 6 Filby Broad is one of the Trinity Broads that are unconnected to the river system and used as storage reservoirs by Essex and Suffolk Water. There is a boardwalk and bird hide on the north side of the broad.
